Honorable Village Board Members,

It is my pleasure to provide a report of activity and accomplishments for 2018. Your significant investment in a full-time Deputy Chief in 2017 has paid great dividends since creating the position nearly two years ago. Not only did it help stabilize paramedic coverage, but it has greatly reduced call response times and provided daytime operational oversight of the department.

We continued to experience substantial growth in call volume. Unfortunately, while this call volume growth is noteworthy, despite our best efforts to increase firefighter/EMT/Paramedics recruits, we have followed local, state and national trending of lower than desired new membership.

Although we did not achieve our recruitment goals last year, we did attract new members whom have begun their required certification training to ensure we have a cross-trained staff able to respond to all hazard emergencies. We were also fortunate to have several former members that took career firefighter positions decide to return to the department to lend their time and expertise to the department.

Our department members are offered diverse in-house training opportunities to ensure their skills sets are kept in an optimal state of readiness with two fire and one EMS training session per month. We are pleased to report that there has been a great deal of interest by department members to get involved with the dive team. It will take approximately one year to get them through their training but the injection of new people on the team was sorely needed!

We also continued our multiple community outreach programs including Public Safety Day, station tours, school visits, birthday parties, Truck-or-Treat Food Drive, Village Tree Lighting, community CPR trainings, child car seat inspections and much more!

It is my hope that this report will highlight the many outstanding achievements that we realized in 2018. Please know that our department members are very much aware that our achievements would not be possible without your continued support!

Executive Summary:

As was mentioned earlier, TFD call volume continues to show substantial growth. 2018 recorded a 13% growth in call volume over the previous year for a total of 827 calls. With this jump in call volume, it is noteworthy to mention call volume in the last two years has jumped a staggering 23%!

In the year and a half since the full-time Deputy Chief position was created, it has proven to be a wise investment. Having a chief officer available to handle the operational needs of the department and to be available for public inquiry regarding fire and life safety codes on construction projects underway and those being planned has been incredibly valuable! Although we continue to experience paramedic/firefighter staffing shortages, Chief Joel Deutsch's position has greatly helped to stabilize the paramedic program. His presence has also decreased average response time down to as little as four minutes in the Village!

Training continues to be a primary focus for the department. Our partnership with Aurora Medical Center continues to show great value from no cost high quality on-site training to reduced cost of advanced life support medications. Our fire suppression training continues to provide an all hazards approach. Our robust training offerings ensure active members skills are maintained at a high level!

As you will recall from last year's annual report, we were unsure about the continuation of providing dive rescue services in the Village. As a result of an internal and external push for new membership on the team, we have had an injection of new people on the team. While it will most likely take a year to get through the entire required dive certification classes, several of the new members are well on their way to being functional members.

Recruitment continues to be a significant challenge and focus of our efforts. Utilizing social media has been instrumental in attracting younger people to the department but the significant amount of our recruits still come from members reaching out to peers in the emergency services field. We will continue to be open to all avenues and mediums for attracting high quality recruits to the department.

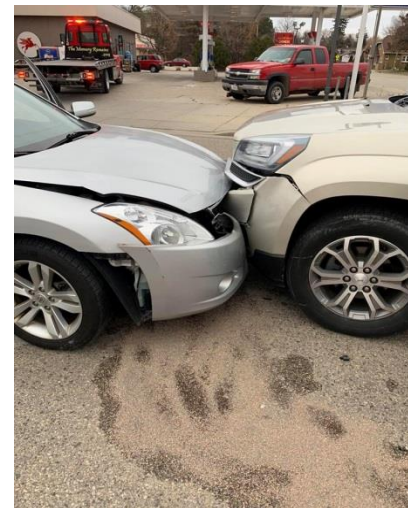
As you will see in the chart below, the departments' response to emergent-level calls in the Village is truly outstanding and beats many career staffed department response times! The department has established response guidelines to greatly reduce risk to public and emergency responders by making only life threatening calls for service as emergent.

Report Description

Fire Ground Training Update:

The department continued its' commitment to basic firefighting skills including hose deployments, search and rescue and ladders. We built on that foundation of skills and introduced advanced skills which included vehicle extrication, application and deployment of rescue airbags and firefighter rescue through rapid intervention training.

Members were also offered training opportunities with other departments. Grafton Fire Department trained on large building hose layouts. Cedarburg hosted a wildland fire evolution and forcible entry skills with the Brew City F.O.O.L.S., an organization of local department members who train others in their free time.

We also conducted training based on incidents with mutual aid and MABAS (Mutual Aid Box Alarm System) incidents which the department has responded to. Call debriefing is a very valuable tool for not only the members who were on the call to review, but also for the rest of the department to provide input and learn from previous experiences.

When 563 returned from refurbishment, members' significant focus was given to training staff on the location of equipment. The department's heavy equipment operators began training on driving and pumping techniques including drafting, supplying other apparatus, hose deployments for structural and vehicle fire suppression situations.

As countless studies prove that exposure to modern products of combustion during firefighting increases firefighter risks of cancer, the department has responded by purchasing new equipment and developing new standard operating guidelines for gross firefighter decontamination. This equipment is used after a firefighter is exposed to the products of combustion prior to returning in an apparatus.

EMS:

As we reflect on 2018 with regards to our Emergency Medical Services, we continue to remain progressive with our services and equipment. However, our staffing continues to be a challenge.

During the year we purchased two video laryngoscopes. These are placed on our two most used vehicles, our frontline ambulance and the paramedic intercept vehicle. With the addition of the video laryngoscopes, we are able to better manage patients who have difficult airways, and establish an airway much faster than with a traditional laryngoscope.

We also were able to obtain approval from the Thiensville Fire Department Corporation to purchase a new paramedic intercept vehicle. We purchased a 2019 Chevrolet Tahoe, which will go into service in early 2019.

Our Medical Direction from Aurora Medical Center in Grafton continues to provide us with progressive protocols, as well as excellent training opportunities. Furthermore, our call volume for emergency medical calls has continued to increase from the prior year. We are responding to more calls than we previously have, but with fewer total staff. The addition of Deputy Chief Deutsch full time, has helped the Department tremendously, but we still have staffing concerns to address. This increase in call volume continues to put a strain on the core responders.

Fire Prevention:

Our fire inspection bureau continues to grow and adapt with the state requirements. Fire Inspector Christopher Wunsch continues to assist with fire inspections under the direction of Deputy Chief Joel Deutsch. We were pleased to meet the goals we set in 2018 which were to work closely with business and property owners. 378 inspections were completed by staff in 2018! Our goal for 2019 is to update some of our ordinances and to have additional lockboxes installed on buildings to provide faster access to structures without causing property damage. We also hope to continue pre-planning activities on higher risk structures.

Fleet Update:

As was mentioned last year, the Department had purchased a pre-owned 2000 rescue-pumper from Slinger Fire Department to replace the 32 year old Seagrave pumper. The purchase price was \$160,000 before refurbishing but Slinger replaced a similarly equipped new engine for \$680,000! The pre-owned vehicle arrived in December of 2018 but was sent out for refurbishing and was completed in spring of 2018.



Dive/Rescue Vehicle 553 & 13-foot Boston Whaler

Holds equipment and supplies for eight divers. Allows for rapid, deep, and ice water rescue operations. Boston Whaler provides peripheral assistance for water rescue operations and safety monitoring of local waterways



Pumper/Tanker 562 - 1997 Pierce Quantum Pumper/Tanker

Features 2,000 gallons per minute pump; 2,500 gallon internal water tank; 40 gallons of Class A foam; equipped for seven firefighters and basic life support EMS supplies.



Intercept Vehicle 555- 2010 Tahoe

Equipped with state-of-the-art Paramedic and RN-level supplies. Used for paramedic intercepts and back-up Command vehicle. This unit will be replacing the van's function in 2019. A new Tahoe was purchased by the TFD Inc. to function as the primary paramedic intercept vehicle.

Fully-equipped for BLS, ALS and Paramedic service



Utility Vehicle 556 - 2000 F-350 Ford Van

Used for on-scene command functions, inspections, and training transportation. It will be sold as surplus in 2019.

4x4 custom-designed vehicle for delivery of EMS and rescue services in all environments, and for large crowd events when ambulance access is difficult or prohibited. Fully-equipped with BLS, ALS and Paramedic/RN supplies.

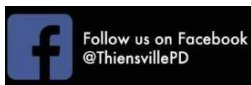


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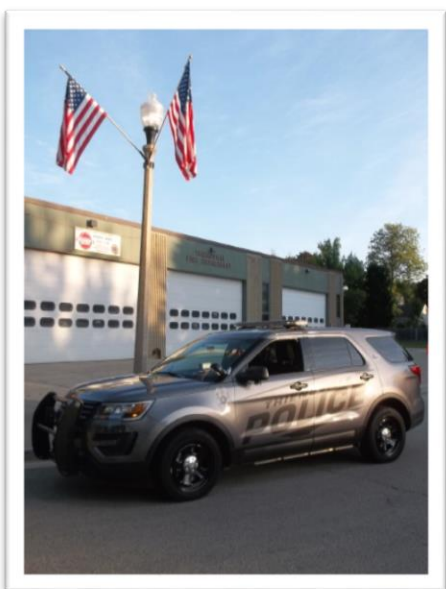
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Uniform Crime Reports

The *Uniform Crime Reports* (UCR) is a program administered by the *Federal Bureau of Investigations* (FBI) that compiles and publishes crime data annually for the entire United States. Police agencies in Wisconsin compile and submit their statistical crime data to the state of *Wisconsin Crime Information Bureau* (CIB) on a monthly basis. CIB then forwards the statistical data to the FBI. This program started in 1929 and has seen changes throughout the years but its intent remains the same, that is, to track and report crime statistics. *Index Crimes* are offenses that include willful homicide, forcible rape, robbery, burglary, aggravated assault, larceny over \$50, motor vehicle theft, and arson. *Non-Index Crimes* include other crimes that the Thiensville Police Department investigates such as: fraud, stolen property, vandalism, narcotic violations, driving under the influence, etc.

Other Activities

The Thiensville Police Department also responds to calls for service that are not criminal in nature. Non-Emergency calls can be officer initiated or citizen generated. Some of the more common non-emergency officer initiated calls include traffic enforcement, business and house checks, and promoting good community relations through citizen interaction. Some of the more common non-emergency citizen calls include loud music, dog at large, or citizen assistance complaints. The Thiensville Police Department is a full-time law enforcement agency open 24 hours a day 365 days a year. Many citizens prefer to speak to an officer in person rather than over the telephone when requesting assistance. Citizens who “stop down” in person at the police department are called “Walk-ins.” Citizens are more than welcome to stop down at the police department at any time to request our service or just to say Hi.

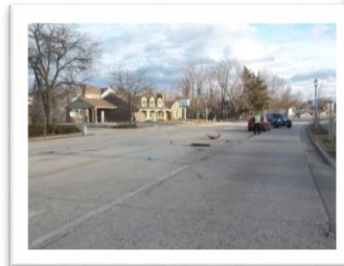

Administrative Assistant/Dispatcher

Heather Boesch is the Department's Administrative Assistant and Dispatcher. Heather is responsible for many functions that are critical to the Department's daily operations. The position provides customer service to citizens, support for the sworn police officers, and it plays an integral role with regard to projects, assignments, and department goals. Daily tasks include, but are not limited to: records management, mailings, collection of money, open records requests, dispatching for Police/Fire/EMS, input data entries from police calls, NCIC entries and updates, phone calls from the general public, and monitoring the department's front lobby window. Heather prides herself on customer service and believes that "everyone deserves to be treated with dignity and respect. I am grateful to be in this position and committed to being a blessing to others each and every day."

Data entry is a never-ending task that Heather completes on a daily basis. Data entry includes submission of the Uniform Crime Reports (UCR), transmitting traffic warnings, traffic citations, parking tickets, and crash reports to the proper entity such as the state of Wisconsin, Ozaukee County Circuit Court, or to the Mid-Moraine Municipal Court. Quality control for data entry is also crucial for it ensures that the record entry is correct and accurate. It is unknown to many that Municipal Court is held at the Thiensville Police Department once a month. Municipal Court encompasses simple plea agreements up to and including court trials for certain traffic and ordinance violations. Prior to court occurring, the Administrative Assistant prepares all the paperwork that is necessary for the Judge, Prosecuting Attorney, and the defendant so that court can run efficiently, effectively, and legally. For the first time in 2018 the Village of Thiensville participated in the Wisconsin State Debt Collection Initiative (SDC) program. Monies such as overdue parking tickets are referred to the Wisconsin Department of Revenue (DOR). DOR is then authorized to collect the debt through a number of options that it has to collect delinquent taxes.

Admin. Assist. Boesch is also equally responsible for dispatching police and fire personnel to calls for service. Dispatcher Boesch dispatches Monday through Friday from 8:00AM to 4:00pm. Dispatcher duties require the ability to multitask. If a call for service comes in, Dispatcher Boesch gathers the appropriate information from the caller, dispatches the appropriate first responder(s), and then is required to keep track of all the personnel working the incident. Some examples of the types of calls for service are; noise complaints, traffic accidents, barking dogs, theft complaints, missing juveniles, disorderly conduct or domestic dispute calls. Although rare, Dispatcher Boesch does handle 911 emergency calls which are transferred from the Ozaukee County Sheriff's Department 911 Dispatch Center. Maintaining a dispatch center involves specialized training, procedures, and policies that are governed by local and State authorities. For example, Dispatcher Boesch is a *Transaction Information for Management of Enforcement* (TIME) System coordinator, trainer and validation officer. The TIME system is a computer software program used by law enforcement agencies to access confidential records such as Driving Records, Criminal Histories, Wanted Persons files, Stolen Property files, etc. These are just a few of the files that can be accessed through the TIME system. Dispatcher Boesch is also responsible for training and keeping certified all department TIME users every two years. The TIME system is the "informational heart" to law enforcement agencies. Understanding the TIME system is not an easy task. The TIME System Manual is just short of 1500 pages!





Community Service & Crime Prevention Officer

The Thiensville Police Department is a community oriented policing department. The police department involves the community and its citizens in crime prevention. Crime prevention cannot be completed with just the police department; it needs the support from the community to achieve this outcome. Our village is safe and secure due to this partnership between the police department and the community.

The Thiensville Police Department will continue to engage in crime prevention activities with information, talks to groups, outreach/event programs, and social media posts to inform the community about recent crimes or proactive approaches to help with safety and security. Crime prevention alerts and tips appear on the Quarterly Village of Thiensville newsletter, on the web page for Thiensville Police Department, Nextdoor community website, and our new Facebook page – Thiensville Police Department. Our department is also connected with a state-wide network that puts out crime bulletins on recent crime trends and suspects. All of these different medias help to make the community members to be informed about events that are happening within the village.

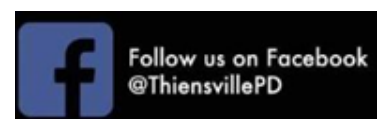


Home and business security inspections are available upon request. Our Community Service Officer (CSO) and Crime Prevention Officer (CPO) is available to respond to your home or business and make recommendations to improve security and safety for your home or business. Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED) is one of the leading medias to help evaluate your home or business for safety. This is a great evaluation to making any home or business more secure and safe through different recommendations for crime prevention.

There are many different events/programs throughout the year that the Thiensville Police Department takes part in such as; Shop with a Cop, Toy Drive with Kapco, Safety Day, Bike Safety, National Night Out, and department tours to name a few. The annual Village Safety Day allows citizens of all ages to talk and interact with officers in a non-stress circumstance and develop a positive relationship with their police department. We display numerous types of equipment, vehicles, and tools used by the police department. There are also different information packets, handouts, and giveaways at the police booth. Our goal is to be a community-oriented department and to learn from your interaction with us.

The police department will continue to conduct business checks and home checks for people on vacation to prevent crime in the village. Residents can sign up for vacation checks on the village website. The department also greets new home owners with a welcome packet. Inside the welcome packet are various information about the village, welcome letters from the village leaders, garbage pickup, voting information, and recent crime activity that is ongoing.

The people of the community being proactive towards crime prevention will aide in keeping the community a safe place to live and work. We need the assistance of businesses and residents to report suspicious events and people. Do not hesitate to report suspicious activity when it is occurring.



Training

Annually, every police officer in the state of Wisconsin is required to complete a minimum of twenty-four hours of continuous law enforcement education/training in order to maintain their sworn police officer certification. The Department strives to keep its officers current with regard to law enforcement practices, procedures, and standards. The Thiensville Police Department is fortunate to have certified instructors, trainers, and experts in the following disciplines: Firearms, Evidence Collection, Less than Lethal Force (Taser, Bean Bags, etc.), Active Shooter Tactics, Emergency Medical Care, Juvenile Investigations, and Crisis Intervention. Officers also have additional training in many other areas that are extremely imperative to the daily operations of the department. In addition to the training listed below, officers are also exposed to legal updates, case law decisions, and updated legislative laws. The following list is an example of some of the education/training that each employee had received in 2018.

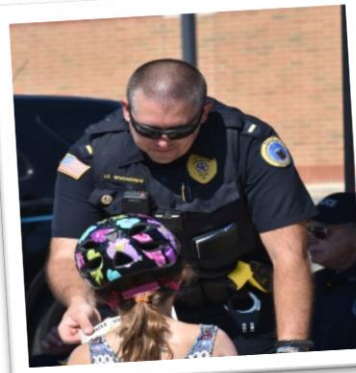

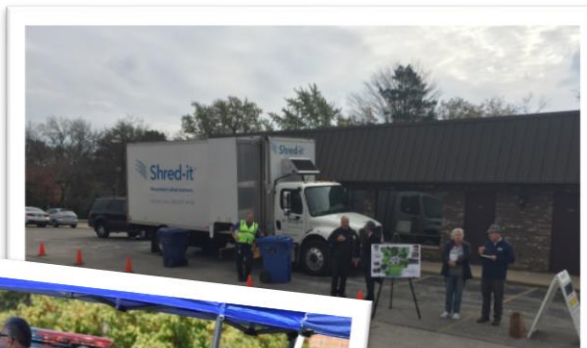

Thiensville Special Police Unit

The Thiensville Special Police Unit was again extremely active throughout 2018 working special events and helping out on a variety of different functions. The Special Police Unit consists of all volunteers who unselfishly dedicate their time and effort to the Village of Thiensville. The Department is extremely grateful for each and every "Special Officer" who has dedicated their time and energy to making the community safe and the events they work enjoyable for all those in attendance. These officers are special people who truly have a "heart of gold." They are ordinary people with an extraordinary desire to serve the public. The benefits of having a Special Police Unit is far deeper than simply "covering a traffic post" for a few hours here and there. Every Special Officer brings with them years of public or private industry experience that can be applied to law enforcement in some shape or form. Special Officers are not sworn law enforcement officers and do not have the authority to make a full custodial arrest. However, Special Officers are trained in traffic control direction, limited self-defense techniques and police radio utilization. Special events such as parades and community celebrations require a significant number of officers to safely manage the crowds of people that are in attendance. In 2018 the Special Officers gave a total of 548 hours of service to the Village of Thiensville for special events. They also receive 218 hours of training. Each year the Special Officers attend training to keep them up to date on current police tactics and procedures. This training occurs on the second Thursday of every month and is two to three hours long in duration. The Special Police provide an invaluable service to the community and without them our sworn officers would be required to work an exorbitant amount of overtime hours at special events to keep these events safe. A special thank you goes out to the Special Police Unit.



Municipal Court

The Village of Thiensville is fortunate to be a member of the Mid-Moraine Municipal Court System. The Court system originally started in Washington County on July 1, 1991 with five participating municipalities and it has since grown to sixteen municipalities located in both Washington and Ozaukee Counties. The Court collectively processes approximately 20,000 citations per year. The Court's Administrative Office is located at 962 W. Paradise Drive, West Bend Wisconsin. What is unique about the Mid-Moraine Municipal Court system is that Judge Steve Cain travels to each jurisdiction to handle all non-criminal cases to include traffic and ordinance violations, rather than having the defendant travel to a centralized location. All Courts are extremely important to our society, for it is the courts that help protect our constitutional rights and due process in a fair and neutral manner.



Juvenile Events

Bike Safety Day was held on June 2, 2018, from 9:00AM — 12:00PM. We received financial donations from *Grube's Towing* for \$200.00 and from the *Thiensville-Mequon Lions Club* for \$350.00. Volunteers from the *Thiensville-Mequon Lions Club* also came to the event to donate and serve ice cream to all who attended. We also had volunteers from *Extreme Ski and Bike* come to the event to conduct complimentary tune ups on all bikes that were brought to the event. Dr. Scott Theirl was able to attend this year to conduct helmet fittings and talk to kids about the safety of wearing bike helmets.

Our Special Police Officers assisted the kids through the bike courses and Dispatcher Heather Boesch assisted with the check-in process. Heather also made sure that the raffle went off smoothly. This year we ran out of prizes, but as luck would have it, the boy who didn't get a prize won the boy's bike at the end.

This year's event was attended by approximately 50 children. I held multiple conversations with parents who were attending the event for the first time and were amazed that they did not have to pay anything to attend. They also could not stop talking about how we were able to put together "such an amazing event with donations."

Safety Town 2018 was held from July 23rd through August 3rd from 8:00AM – 10:00AM and 10:30AM – 12:30AM at *Wilson Elementary School* in the library. This year we had 23 children attended session I and 37 children attended session II for a total of 60 children. We had the honor of 14 volunteer instructors to help with this year's program. Officer Umhoefer (Mequon Police Department) and I were instructing both weeks and Lt. Chad Wucherer helped during the first week.

This year's program welcomed back the *Ozaukee County Humane Society* to talk about animal safety. Also, *Ozaukee County Family Services* talked about Internet Safety. We also had the pleasure of welcoming back Randy Short and K9 Ember who talked about fire safety and helped organize a Fire Department Tour. *Johnson Bus* donated a bus and driver again this year to help with bus safety and to transport the children from Wilson School to the Thiensville Police and Fire Departments for the tours. We continued to use the *Yell and Tell* program to help talk about poison, strangers, and water safety. There is a handout that went home to parents that instructs them to notify either the *Yell and Tell* program or our department if the children use the program in a real situation so the child can be recognized. *Yell and Tell* has a process in place for the recognition.

Port Washington State Bank (PWSB) and the *Optimist Club* attended the Graduation Ceremony. PWSB donated and handed out ice cream and the *Optimist Club* handed out ID tags for children. PWSB has expressed interest in having a more active role, financially, in this program. I referred them to the *Optimist Club* as the first year of the three-year fundraising cycle for Safety Town starts in 2019.

I enjoyed my time at these events and enjoyed working with everyone to make them a success. I can see the positive outcome that events like these have with the community and with our youth. I hope to be able to reach out to more of our businesses next year to increase our donation amount so our Bike Day raffle stock is better prepared. I have already been approached by businesses wishing to participate. Thank you for your support in community events like this.

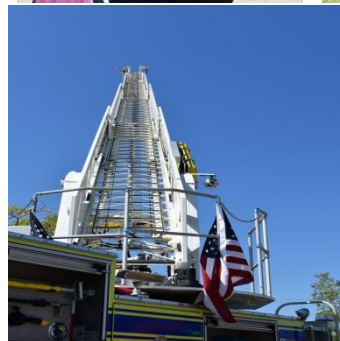


Community Involvement

Halloween's Trick or Treat or "Beggar's Night" we saw a large amount of kids and had a fun afternoon. Our department helped with crossings on Freistadt Rd for safety. Families were assisted in crossing at Vernon, Park Crest, Alta Loma, and Madero. At those locations along with the two squads that were out patrolling, while different treats awaited the children in the community.



The next event that the Thiensville Police Department participated in was Shop with a Cop. This event gives the opportunity to in-need children to go shopping with a law enforcement officer to buy holiday gifts for their family. This event brings together law enforcement officers from around the county to help kids and their families. Each year officers from the Thiensville Police Department donate their time to this event. This year 30 kids participated in the event. This event has helped out approximately 160 families over the last few years.

The Last event of the year was the Police Department's annual toy drive to benefit KIDS2KIDS Toy Drive. Toys are gathered from the community and then a caravan of police and fire trucks deliver them to Kapco in Grafton where they are distributed to families throughout Ozaukee County and southeastern Wisconsin. ***A special thanks to the Mequon Thiensville Junior Women's Club for having donation boxes and helping to publicize the toy drive!!!!***

ORDINANCE NO. 2019-03
AN ORDINANCE AMENDING
SECTION 74-61 RELATING TO PARKING
RESTRICTIONS AND PROHIBITIONS**

WHEREAS, the Village of Thiensville Board of Trustees desires to regulate the use of Village of Thiensville streets for parking and to make certain areas available to handicapped individuals; and

WHEREAS, the Village Board finds that regulating the parking on Village streets is in the best interest of the health, general welfare, and safety of Village Residents.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Village Board of the Village of Thiensville does ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. Section **74-61** of the Village of Thiensville Municipal Code is hereby amended as follows:

Sec. 74-61. - Parking restrictions and prohibitions.

The following parking restrictions and prohibitions shall be applicable to all streets within the Village of Thiensville's corporate limits:

- (1) Restricted parking. No person shall park a vehicle for more than 30 minutes between 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. any day, except physicians on emergency calls, on any street in the village.
- (2) No person shall, at any time, park in any area posted that parking is prohibited.
- (3) Parking is prohibited on any bridge in the village.
- (4) Handicapped parking. The following area shall be reserved for parking by handicapped persons:

On the east side of Orchard Street from a point 46 feet north of the north curblin of Buntrock Avenue to a point 96 feet north of the north curblin of Buntrock Avenue.

SECTION 2. Severability. If any provision of this ordinance is invalid or unconstitutional, such invalidity or unconstitutionality shall not affect the other provisions of this ordinance.

SECTION 3. Effective date. This ordinance shall be effective upon publication.

**VILLAGE OF THIENSVILLE
OZAUKEE COUNTY, WISCONSIN
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WHEREAS, the Village of Thiensville Board of Trustees desires to regulate the use of Village of Thiensville streets for parking; and

WHEREAS, the Village Board finds that regulating the parking on Village streets is in the best interest of the health, general welfare, and safety of Village Residents.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Village Board of the Village of Thiensville does ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. Section **74-61** of the Village of Thiensville Municipal Code is hereby amended and restated to read in its entirety as follows:

Sec. 74-61. - Parking restrictions and prohibitions.

The following parking restrictions and prohibitions shall be applicable to all streets within the Village of Thiensville's corporate limits:

(1) Parking Restrictions.

- a. On any street or municipally owned parking lot where official signs are posted giving notice of such limitations, no person shall park a vehicle for more than 30 minutes between 2:00 a.m. and 6:00.
- b. Between December 1 and April 1, or during a snow emergency, no person shall park a vehicle for more than 30 minutes between 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. any day, except physicians on emergency calls, on any street in the village.
- c. No person shall park an unregistered vehicle, or any tractor, trailer, camper, truck or vehicle weighing in excess of 9,000 lbs. or exceeding 18 feet in length for more than 30 minutes between 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. any day on any street in the village.
- d. No person shall park a vehicle in a single spot for a continuous period to exceed 48 hours on any street in the village.

(2) Prohibited Parking, Stopping and Standing.

- a. No person shall stop or leave any vehicle standing in any of the following places except temporarily for the purpose of and while actually engaged in loading or unloading or in receiving or discharging passengers and while the vehicle is attended by a licensed operator so that it may promptly be moved in case of an emergency or to avoid obstruction of traffic:
 - i. In a loading zone.
 - ii. In an alley in a business district.
 - iii. Within 10 feet of a fire hydrant, unless a greater distance is indicated by an official traffic sign.
 - iv. Within 3 feet of the entrance to an alley or a private road or driveway.
 - v. Closer than 10 feet to the near limits of a crosswalk.
 - vi. Upon any portion of a highway where and at the time when parking is prohibited, limited or restricted by official traffic signs.
- b. No person shall, at any time, park in any area posted that parking is prohibited.
- c. Parking is prohibited on any bridge in the village.

SECTION 2. Severability. If any provision of this ordinance is invalid or unconstitutional, such invalidity or unconstitutionality shall not affect the other provisions of this ordinance.

SECTION 3. Effective date. This ordinance shall be effective upon publication.
